



About the Campus

The University of Minnesota, Crookston (UMC) is located 290 miles northwest of the Twin Cities. As a coordinate campus of the University of Minnesota, UMC derives many advantages from its connection to one of the nation's largest universities. Yet, with an enrollment of 1,700 students, UMC maintains a personalized educational atmosphere.

UMC has a 237 – acre campus located on the northern edge of Crookston. The college facilities consist of 29 buildings. UMC is situated in one of the richest and most diversified agricultural regions in the United States, the Red River Valley. The college has many well-equipped special purpose laboratories to support its instructional programs. Instruction is supported by computer and two-way, audio-video interactive television connections to other higher educational institutions and high schools. Facilities built within the last decade include an indoor arena, animal science teaching laboratory, and a stable; an enlarged library and learning media resource center addition; a food service and hotel, restaurant and institutional management building; a large indoor physical education and intercollegiate athletic complex, a newly renovated football stadium with a new press box, bleachers, track & lights; an expanded student center, a bookstore; and a new multimillion dollar controlled environmental science facility.

UMC's applied, employment oriented programs focus on active learning, career applications, specialized skills, and extensive use of technology. As a part of tuition and fees, each full-time student is issued a notebook computer. The computer plays a vital role in a UMC's student's education. It is the student's to use at all times as long as that student remains enrolled at UMC. Each course taken at UMC makes use of the computer so students find a means of applying their computer skills to virtually every task.

In October of 1996 IBM announced that UMC would be one of the 25 colleges and universities around the world as a charter member of the IBM Global Campus. IBM Global Campus provides a combination of advanced technologies, network computing solutions, applications, consulting and services tailored to enable colleges and universities to expand their offerings to new groups of students.

About one-third of UMC's students take advantage of the UMC community spirit by living on campus in the residence halls. First-year students live in either McCall Hall or Skyberg Hall, both of which are coed. Upperclassmen generally live in on-campus apartments (Lee Hall or Brink Hall) or in the residence Robertson Hall. A 48 bed apartment complex, named West Side Apartment Complex, opened fall 1997.

Athletics – at both the varsity and intramural levels – contribute to the close-knit community feeling on campus.

Varsity sports include football, basketball, hockey, baseball, and golf for men; volleyball, soccer, golf, basketball, fastpitch softball and equestrian for women.

A Brief History of UMC

1851

The Minnesota Territorial Laws of 1851, chapter 3, establish the University of Minnesota (at what is now its Minneapolis campus) and vest its government in a Board of Regents. This statute was approved on February 25, 1851

1858

Minnesota becomes a state.

1879

The city of Crookston is incorporated.

1895

The Minnesota legislature appropriates \$30,000 to procure equipment and to construct two experimental research farms, one at Morris and one at Crookston. The Great Northern Railway, under the guidance of **James J. Hill**, donates 476.61 acres. The Northwest Experiment Station is established.

1905

Minnesota legislature appropriates \$15,000 to establish the <u>Northwest School of Agriculture</u>, a regional residential agricultural high school. The school provides training in "the technical and practical business of agriculture and in the art of homemaking." The term of schooling begins in October and ends in March to accommodate farm students.



The first class graduates from the Northwest School of Agriculture.

1963

With the changing demands of the region and in the agriculture industry, it becomes apparent to state officials that a college-level technical educational institution is urgently needed. A study by the University of Minnesota Bureau of Field Studies begins an examination of new roles for the Northwest School of Agriculture. University Regents discuss launching a college-level technical institute.

1965

Dr. Stanley D. Sahlstrom is appointed head of the <u>University of Minnesota Technical Institute</u> to be located on the campus of the Northwest School of Agriculture in Crookston.

1966

Classes begin in September at the University of Minnesota Technical Institute. Associate in Applied Science degrees are offered in three academic divisions: Agriculture, Business, and General Studies. Dedication ceremonies for the new college are held on November 30, 1966. Students of the Northwest School of Agriculture and the U of M "Tech" share the campus through the spring of 1968.

1968

The final class of the Northwest School of Agriculture graduates in the school's 60th commencement ceremonies.

The first class graduates from the University of Minnesota Technical Institute, now an official coordinate campus of the University of Minnesota. (Renamed University of Minnesota Technical College in 1969.)

1985

Dr. Donald Sargeant is appointed provost of Crookston campus. The title for all coordinate campus chief executive officers is changed from provost to chancellor.

1988

University of Minnesota Regents officially change name of Crookston campus to University of Minnesota, Crookston. 1992

U of M Board of Regents gives UMC approval to offer baccalaureate degree programs at its June meeting. 1993

UMC's baccalaureate degree programs are approved by the Minnesota Higher Education Coordinating Board and accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools. Three academic divisions support the new polytechnic concept: Agricultural Management, Management, and Technical Studies. Classes for the baccalaureate degrees begin that fall. In the fall UMC's technology component is also initiated, providing each full-time student with a notebook computer and preinstalled software.

1994

UMC's first bachelor of science degrees are awarded at commencement ceremonies. A small group of students had been working on a "3 + 1" degree agreement before UMC had been authorized to offer four-year degrees. In the spring of 1994, twenty-four students receive their B.S. degree at UMC.

1998

A new structure for Academic Affairs redefines program areas into four academic centers and one technology support center.

UMC is ranked third in "Best Midwest Regional Colleges" by US News for the 1998-99 year.

1999

UMC moves up to rank second in "Best Midwest Regional Colleges" by US News for the 1999-2000 year.

2000


Yahoo! Internet Life Magazine Online ranks UMC the "#1 Most Wired College" in its category (Baccalaureate II) for 2000.

UMC remains ranked at second in "Best Midwest Regional Colleges" by US News for the 2000-2001 year.

2001

UMC is honored with the "Pioneer Award" at the Fourth Annual Conference on Ubiquitous Computing, held January 4-6, 2001, at Seton Hall University in South Orange, New Jersey.

The Wall Street Journal calls UMC "The College of the Future—Today" in special section on technology and education that includes a full-page feature on UMC appearing in the Monday, March 12, edition.

2005 Season Outlook

After a heartbreaking 2004 season that was riddled with injuries, fifth year head coach Chris Przemieniecki and the UMC Women's Soccer team will look to "Revive in '05". Nine new incoming players will be looked upon to replace those lost to graduation, personal set-backs, and most significantly, injuries. Once again, the Golden Eagles squad consists of players from around the country with representation this year coming from the Mid-South region, the North, and the East Coast. Only 6 players return from the 2004 season that includes remaining seniors **Christie Chappell** from Ontario, Canada and **Cory Sak** from Las Vegas, Nevada. The Golden Eagles look to rebuild for the 2005 season and make their mark in the NSIC.

Leading the way for the Golden Eagle attack this fall is two-time All-Conference, 3-time team MVP, and the Golden Eagles' all-time leading goal scorer senior Christie Chappell. Another returning standout that ranks second in team scoring is junior **Brittany Efird** from Joplin, Missouri. Between Chappell and Efird they have amassed 30 goals and 14 assists in just three seasons. The new addition up front is freshman **Jessica Vlatkovich** from Wayzata, Minnesota. Vlatkovich has led her club team and high school team in total points and will provide the necessary offensive punch for the Golden Eagles this fall.

In the midfield, the Golden Eagles are led by senior Cory Sak and junior **Kami Lucius** from Traverse City, Michigan. Supporting the returning midfielders are a young but very talented midfield class. Locally, UMC Soccer has acquired the services of Crookston High School standout **Amber Erdmann**. Though Erdmann has been recognized as the Offensive Player of the Year at CHS and currently holds the record for the most goals, she is anticipated to be filling in as a midfielder. Coming from Rapid City, South Dakota is **Becky Thorbjornsen**, an All-State selection, team MVP, and a club standout with exceptional vision. In the opposite direction geographically **Samantha Bentz** from Baltimore, Maryland, another player with superb vision, will be looked upon to help anchor the midfield. Bentz comes from a strong high school program and exceptional club team that has competed nationwide. Finally from Rice Lake, Wisconsin is All-Conference and team MVP **Alyssa Jensen**. Jensen participated in the Wisconsin high school senior bowl and the 2005 USYSA Regional play-offs with her club team.

Defensively, the Golden Eagles retained the services of **Allison Warren** from Burlington, Ontario and sophomore **Kiely Bladow** from Monument, Colorado. Both have been the crux of the Eagle defense and bring a tremendous amount of experience to the back line. However, the addition of Chicago suburb native **Elizabeth Kennedy**, an MVP in high school will keep things balanced in the back.

The goalkeeping position is considered the strongest and deepest for the Golden Eagles this fall. Three new goalkeepers will challenge for a starting position. The most experienced is junior college transfer **Mikael Joy Laajala** of Houston, Texas. Laajala led her team to the 2003 Junior College National Championships and was ranked 11th in 2003 and 8th in 2004the country in 2004 for GAA. Laajala is a NJCAAAll-Region and All-American selection. Another high school and club standout from Texas is freshman **Aimie Theobalt** (Houston, TX). Theobalt is an All-District and team MVP in high school. The Golden Eagles' third goalkeeper hails from Eden Prairie Minnesota, freshman **Megan Fagerhaug**.

Chris Przemieniecki:

Chris Przemieniecki will begin his 15th season in collegiate soccer and his fifth as the head coach for the University of Minnesota-Crookston Golden Eagles. After a NSIC tournament appearance in 2003 that turned some heads, 2004 was hampered with season ending injuries such as torn ACL's and broken legs that left them with a 3-15-0 record. Despite the Golden Eagle record, Przemieniecki lead the Golden Eagles to another program first, defeating Wayne State 3-2 at home.

Przemieniecki has also coached for NCAA Division I, NCAA Division III and NAIA institutions. He began his coaching career in 1991 where he was an assistant/goalkeeper men's soccer coach at Wilmington College (OH). From '92-'94, he served as the men's assistant / goalkeeper coach at Illinois State University, a NCAA Division I institution. From '94-'95, he was head men's and women's soccer coach at Marycrest International University (IA), a NAIA institution. From '95-'98, he was the head men's soccer coach

at Marietta College (OH), a NCAA Division III school. While at Marietta, he guided MC to their first conference tournament appearance and regional ranking. From '98-'99, he returned to serve as a NCAA Division I men's assistant soccer coach at Bowling Green State University (OH). In '99-'01, Przemieniecki served as the head men's and assistant women's soccer coach at Lambuth University (TN). As the men's coach, he recorded 20 wins in two seasons including a conference tournament title, a NAIA regional championship appearance, and a national ranking of #22 in 1999. The women's team qualified each season for the conference tournament and reached the final four in 1999. In April of 2000, Przemieniecki served as a guest coach with the Polish Soccer Federation and Poland's Men's National team and the Under 21's.

In addition to his collegiate responsibilities, Przemieniecki holds a USSF "A" License, teaches coaching courses for US Soccer, and is a staff coach for Region II Olympic Development Program, the Minnesota Youth Soccer Association, and the North Dakota Soccer Association. Locally, Przemieniecki serves as Director of Coaching and Player Development for the Crookston Youth Soccer Association.

A former goalkeeper, Przemieniecki has experience at the amateur, collegiate, and international levels. He played collegiately at Otterbein College in Ohio (1987-1989) where he was part of two conference championship seasons. He then traveled overseas and trained for a summer with Augustov and Olysten, club teams in Poland. From 1989-1992, he played semi-professional with Edelweiss F.C., winning the Ohio Men's Senior State Championship in 1990 and earned a trip to the U.S. Senior National Championships. In the spring/summer of 1992, Przemieniecki returned overseas to Spain to play and train with Heriz F.C. and San Fernando F.C.
